WASHINGTON - The nation's 43 million disabled will mark the end of a long battle against bias when President Bush signs legislation making it a crime to discriminate against people with physical or mental handicaps. More than 2,000 people representing major disability groups from across the country were invited to join the president at the White House on Thursday for the signing of The Americans with Disabilities Act.

PHNOM PENH - Cambodia turned over to a U.S. military delegation Thursday six sets of remains believed to be Americans missing since the Vietnam War. The remains, released after the signing of the first formal agreement between the United States and the government installed in Cambodia by a Vietnamese invasion in 1978, were loaded aboard an Air Force C-141 cargo jet for transport to a U.S. army laboratory in Hawaii where experts will attempt to identify them.

MIAMI - Tropical Storm Arthur lashed Grenada and Tobago with high winds and rains Wednesday and then neared hurricane strength as it moved across the open Caribbean on a course for the Greater Antilles, hurricane forecasters said. A tropical storm watch was issued for the southern coasts of Puerto Rico and Hispaniola. Forecasters at the National Hurricane Center said Arthur's path would be difficult to project for the next day or so.

GENEVA - OPEC oil ministers began a mid-year conference Thursday predicting a consensus accord on raising production and prices following an easing of tension between Gulf members Iraq and Kuwait. The first formal plenary session began with oil ministers Issam Abdul Al-Chalabi of Iraq and Kuwait's Salim Al-Ameeri sitting side-by-side because of the standard alphabetic seating arrangement.

CAIRO, Egypt - Tension in the Persian Gulf decreased with Iraq's pledge to not use force against Kuwait ahead of a planned weekend meeting between the oil-producing giants in Saudi Arabia to thrash out their dispute.

CHTAURA, Lebanon - A fuel tanker blew up in a Syrian-policed town in eastern Lebanon, killing up to 45 people and injuring many others, security officials and radio reports said Thursday. The tanker exploded late Wednesday in front of a hotel in the town of Chtaura, 22 miles east of Beirut, the officials said, killing eight people and injuring 22 others.

PANMUNJOM, North Korea - South and North Korea finalized an agreement Thursday setting the stage for unprecedented talks between prime ministers of the two countries divided in bitter conflict since the end of World War II. Officials of the two sides met at the truce village of Panmunjom, 35 miles north of Seoul and signed a final accord on the first-ever inter-Korea prime ministerial talks set to begin in September.

CAPE CANAVERAL - After failing another fuel leak, the space shuttle Atlantis will return to its hangar for repairs and be replaced with the shuttle Columbia, which will blast off on a scientific mission in early September, officials said. Under the new plan, Atlantis's launch on a four-day military flight will be delayed until after the shuttle Discovery's takeoff Oct. 5 on a high-priority flight to ferry the Ulysses solar probe into space.

CAPE CANAVERAL - A scientific satellite ferried into orbit five days late by an Atlas 1 rocket will paint Earth's invisible magnetic field with clouds of glowing chemicals that will mimic the northern lights. The chemical releases, scheduled to begin in September and continue through next July, should be visible throughout the United States, creating celestial displays that resemble the aurora borealis, or northern lights.

FOOTBALL

Well, it's finally here folks, the game you've been waiting for. On Sunday, the 12th of August, AFAN Radio will air in its entirety the play-off game of the year between the Sabers and the Destroyers. This will be the first time in football history that a Super-Bowl play-off game will take place at Willy Field, the home of the Penguin Bowl. In this weeks addition of the Night Times we will take a look at the Coaches and Offensive players for each team.

The Destroyers are led by Coach Mark Desimone who has a career record of 116 wins and 35 losses. This is Desimone's second year as Head Coach for the Destroyers, however, he is not as inexperienced as most of you would think. He spent three years as the Head Coach for the NY Jets and four years were spent with the Bills. In his coaching career he had a team in the Superbowl a total of four times, leaving with a record of one win and three losses. For Desimone, this play-off game means everything. Just under Desimone is Offensive Coach, Jerry Rippy. This is Rippy's first year with the Destroyers and has done quite well for himself. Rippy has worked with Desimone in the past, coaching the Offensive Line of the Jets for three of the four years Desimone was in control of the team. Rippy was picked up by Desimone after a controversial ending as the Offensive Coach for the LA Radiers.

As for the Offensive line-up for the Destroyers, well they are certainly something to see. Led by starting Quarter-Back, Mark "Air" McCathren and back-up Quarter Back Tony "Da Boom Da Boom" Marcetti the Destroyers have quite the line up. Marcetti is the latest rookie sensation to hit the big time. He often fills in for McCathren late in the final quarter of the game. Coach Rippy still feels that the rookie

needs some experience before being brought in to play as a starting player. Starting with Full Back, #22 Gene "Bulldog" Starks. Starks is a fourth year man who really knows how to gain yardage on the carry. In his last game he managed to get 92 yards on 29 carries, and scored 1 touch down for the Destroyers just when they needed it.

Playing Half Back, is #32, Robert "W/O Bob" Prentice. Prentice has been in the Pro-Bowl a number of 4 times. When the big play comes in, watch for W/O Bob in the receiving end of it. Wide Receiver; #07, Pete "the Fly" Ferrara. Recruited to the Destroyers from Princeton University. Ferrara has been in the Pro-Bowl 3 years in a row and in one game scored an eighty yard touch down. "the Fly" is probably one of the quickest Wide Receivers in the game today.

When it comes to Tight Ends, watch for #26, Rick "No" Bull. In his last game, Bull fumbled the ball after a hard hit, but was able to recover it. Although this was probably his worst game this season, Bull is one of the best of his time. After last weeks game, Bull was picked up for a DWI and Resisting Arrest, however was released on his own reconnaissance. Hopefully, Rick will be at his best for this up and coming play-off game. Second season, End, #10, Jerry Ray Clark. Although Clark is one of the youngest players for the Destroyers, he has really played well under the supervision of Coach Rippy. When the going gets tough, the Destroyers usually can count on Receiver #19, Bud "I'm Gone" Chambers. Chambers is a 2nd year man from FSU. He has played in three Orange Bowls and was voted MVP in his second Orange Bowl. Last week Chambers completed three passes for 62 yards. Chambers is one of the Destroyers best, although due to an injury suffered last week we may not get the chance to see one of his famous performances.

First season, Receiver, #36, Rob "I'm your Bet" Sweat has

had a great season with the Destroyers. Last week he caught 4 passes for 23 yards a piece. The Sabers had better watch out for this young man from Harvard, he's sure to give them a run for their money.

Let's not forget the front line holding it all together for the Destroyers. Starting with #44 James "I'm Fine" Stine the Offensive Captain. As Tackle, Stine is the oldest player on the team and has been to the Pro-Bowl 5 times. When it comes to blocking, Stine is definitely the man for the job. With four time Pro-Bowler, #11, Ed "Hit Man" Dunn, at Stine's side this makes for a strong line. Dunn, an eight year Tackle from the University of Stanford has been known to make some hard hits causing destruction to the opponents. At Center, #38, Dallas "Does Debbie" Davis. Davis from Penn State is with the Destroyers for his third season. He works great with Stine and really makes for a great cover for "Air" McCathren.

Fourth year guard, #15, Steve "the Crusher" Jackymowski makes for a complete front line. After suffering a severe knee injury 2 years ago causing him to miss an entire season, he's back and playing better than ever.

At Guard, #33, Robockie walk on, Chuck "Face Mask" Mahenski. Mahenski earned his position by beating out a veteran. Although he's inexperienced and gets caught holding too often, with a little encouragement will someday be a great asset to the Offensive line for the Destroyers.

Traded from the Vikings two weeks ago, Randy "End Zone" Olsen is the new Kicker/Punter for the Destroyers. Olsen from the University of Minnesota was traded for 2nd Draft Choice and a player to be named later.

#3, John "Sure Shot" Stinson-Wildge. Fifth year Field Goal Kicker has had a 50/50 season this year. In last weeks game he scored 6 points for the Destroyers in the second half of the game.

giving them the win and bringing them to this big play off game.

As for the Sabers, well, their lead by Head Coach Darryl Sisk. Prior to his five years with the Sabers, Sisk served 6 years with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Coach Sisk has a record of 110 wins, 22 losses. He has brought his team to the Superbowl 3 times with a record of 1 win, 2 losses. Assisting Sisk with the Offensive players of the Sabers is Coach Boone. This is Boone's ninth season with the Sabers. His only other coaching experience has been with a community little league team. However, Boone is a sharp man and has really got these Sabers fine tuned.

The Sabers are going to be a tough team to beat. For the Destroyers this play-off game will be no walk in the park.

The Sabers Offense is lead by #18, Quarterback, Harry "the Scream" Reams a fourth year player from Notre Dame. But we must not forget to mention #14, back up Quarterback, JR "eat a peach" Allman who was voted MVP while playing with the 49ers. Reams has been starting for the Sabers due to nagging knee injuries suffered by Allman. However, Coach Boone likes to use Allman every chance he can, especially during crucial moments in a game.

At Full Back, #26 Chet "Big Foot" Tussy. Number 1 draft choice from USC. He has played is fourth season for the Sabers and has proven to be an outstanding running back. In his last game he ran 31 carries for a total of 163 yards.

From Penn State, #17, Jerry "Turn it On" Powers at Half Back. Powers joined the Sabers at the beginning of this season after being traded from Detroit. In last weeks game, Powers completed 17 carries for 133 yards and scored 2 touch downs in a romp over Miami.

The other Half Back for the Sabers is #38, Mike "Rowboat" Robinson. Robinson is a fifth year man from USC. Although "Rowboat" has not had a

Sabers he has been brought in by Coach Boone during the critical moments in a game.

#22, Bob "The Doc" Hartford, Wide Receiver from Stanford University. Hartford a 3 year all pro has won just about every award possible during his college years. Plus made the winning catch with virtually no time left on the clock during the Rose Bowl. There's always, #21, Roger "On Fire" LaFlamme, also a Wide Receiver for the Sabers. LaFlamme is a second year man from San Jose State. This Wide Receiver is great on the deep passes from Reams and most often opponents have a hard time catching him once he's on the move.

Receiver, #32, Mike "No Name" Arthur, the Receiver the Destroyers must watch out for. Arthur is a four time all pro, fifth year player from Hofstra University on Long Island. Prior to joining the Sabers he played three years with the NY Giants. During his last game, Arthur played his best game ever, completing 12 passes for a completion of 213 yards.

#13, Tight End, Terry "the Other Catch" Clark. A fifth year man from LSU who made the greatest catch playing in the Peach Bowl. That completed pass was caught from JR Allman. So if Boone, decides to put Allman into this play off game, the Allman/Clark combination will certainly be something to watch for.

Playing Center for the Sabers is #16, Pat Eckenrode. A seventh year man from Penn State. Eckenrode has been an All-Pro center 3 times and is also the Sabers Co-Captain.


#17, Tackle, Dino Kontinos. Kontinos is a solid fifth year player from UCLA. Kontinos was traded to the Sabers from the Seahawks during the Player's strike last season. The other Offensive Tackle is #18, Frank Vavounas, originally from Oklohoma State is in his second year with the Sabers. He gained his starting position here on the line after beating

out 12 year All-Pro Veteran. At Guard for the Sabers are Robert Shope, #34 and Greg

sixth year vet from Harvard. He has not missed a game to date in his career. Not even while playing little league football at age eight. Groshens on the other hand, from the University of Texas is coming back strong after a shoulder injury two years ago. Together these two players make for a strong front line. Special Teams, a Coach Sisk trade mark, consist of #10, Dan "Too Sure" Franklin, Field Goal Kicker. Franklin comes to the Sabers from the University of Calgary. He can usually kick from anywhere on the field and make the extra point. #28, Dave Pierce, Kick returner, three year man from Princeton. Although Pierce is a part of the Special Teams force of the Sabers, he is hoping to gain a running back slot in the seasons ahead. Then there is always #31, Jim Elston, Saber's punt returner. Elston comes to the Sabers from the University of hard knocks. In other words folks, he is a walk on who acts like he is still running from the police. Coach Boone was very eager to take this boy under his coaching wing.

So, as you can see, each team has a very strong Offensive line-up. The question still remains...who will win this football game. In next weeks issue of The Nite Times, we will take a look at the defensive coaches and players for both the Destroyers and the Sabers, along with exclusive interviews of members of each team. CAIRO, Egypt - Iraqi troops invaded Kuwait and bombed its capital before dawn Thursday after talks between the two nations broke down over oil and border disputes. Heavy casualties were reported and assessments by numerous diplomats and government officials indicate Iraq has occupied its much smaller neighbor to the south. The U.N. Security Council was called into emergency session Thursday.

WASHINGTON - President Bush, condemning the 'outrageous' Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, signed an executive order Thursday freezing all Iraqi property and assets in the United States and in overseas branches. The order also freezes Kuwaiti assets and property 'in order to prevent their takeover' by the invading Iraqi forces, Deputy White House press secretary Roman Popaduk said. According to U.S. diplomats in Iraq, 12 warships, including the aircraft carrier USS Independence, were steaming from the Indian Ocean to the Gulf to complement an American naval force of seven ships already on 'alert' status.

CAIRO - Egypt President Hosni Mubarak called for an emergency meeting of the Arab League in response to Iraq's invasion Thursday of Kuwait, a foreign ministry spokesman said. In a related development, Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Saud al Faisal said in Cairo Thursday he had convened an emergency meeting of the six-member Gulf Cooperation Council to discuss Iraq's military action against Kuwait.

CAPE CANAVERAL - A Delta 2 rocket successfully boosted a \$65 million satellite into orbit Thursday after a spectacular predawn blastoff, completing another link in a global network of space-based military navigation beacons. The 126-foot, blue-and-white rocket roared to life at 1:39 a.m. EDT and smoothly climbed away from launch pad 17A at the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, lighting up the night sky for miles around as it streaked through a cloudless night sky.

IRKUTSK, Siberia, U.S.S.R. - Secretary of State James Baker and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze, ending two days of talks Thursday, agreed a treaty to cut conventional arms should be signed at the all-European summit in Paris in November. The two diplomats also agreed to work for free elections in Cambodia and Afghanistan to end more than a decade of conflicts in those two countries, a joint communique said.

PORT-OF-SPAIN, Trinidad - Acting Prime Minister Winston Dookeran said his nation made no deals to get Moslem rebels to release hostages and surrender unconditionally after a six-day standoff that killed up to 300 people. Police and troops arrested 111 rebels of the Libyan-backed Jamaat Muslimen Wednesday after the insurgents released all their hostages from the state-owned television station and the Parliament building.

WASHINGTON - Under the gun from a budget-cutting Congress, President Bush was poised to endorse a reduction and reconfiguration of U.S. military forces to meet new security requirements in the post-Cold War era. The diminution of East-West tensions, disintegration of the Warsaw Pact and the spread of democracy from Panama to Poland have altered the threats and assumptions underlying U.S. military planning since the end of World War II.

GALVESTON, Texas - The state banned removal of shellfish and other marine animals Thursday from the Galveston Bay Estuary, declared a disaster area after being polluted by 500,000 gallons of heavy oil. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issued the ban beginning at midnight following an order issued by the state Department of Health, which cited the possible oil contamination of aquatic life. The ban will remain in effect until further notice, state Health Commissioner Dr. Robert Bernstein said.

smoking a cigarette and will eventually help to overcome the urge.

HEALTH NEWS

Cancer of the mouth, lips, tongue, pharynx and larynx killed an estimated 12,350 Americans in 1989. Each year, approximately 20,000 new cases of oral cancer are reported in the US, accounting for about 5% of cancers in men and 2% in women. With the increase in women smokers and drinkers, the percentage of difference between men and women is progressively decreasing. Cigarettes, chewing tobacco and alcohol are major risk factors for oral and neck cancer. While oral cancers of less than 1cm in diameter are easily cured, most lesions are not detected until they have spread to the lymph nodes in the neck and are difficult to treat effectively.

Recent research is indicating that beta

carotene, a substance found in carrots and converted by to vitamin A in the body, may reverse precancerous mouth and throat lesions. Dr. Garewal of the University of Arizona cancer center in Tucson, working with 25 subjects with precancerous oral lesions and taking 30mg of beta carotene a day (about 4 to 6 medium sized carrots), noted that 70% of his subjects had a decreased or completed elimination of their lesions. Despite Dr. Garewal's observation, more research is still needed before beta carotene is accepted as a treatment for precancerous oral and throat lesions because vitamin A can be toxic at high levels.

Since most oral and throat cancers are detected when it's too late for corrective treatment, prevention is imperative. Furthermore, surgical treatment can leave a patient seriously disfigured and unable to speak or eat normally. The next time you get the urge to chew or smoke tobacco, try chewing or smoking a carrot.

FOOTBALL MCMURDO STYLE

Last week the Nite Times reviewed the Coaches and Offensive Line Up of the Sabers and the Destroyers. This week we will take a look at those players who make up the Defensive Units of these two very tough teams.

Assistant Coach, Larry Cook has done a fine job keeping the Defensive Unit of the Destroyers in top shape. Cook in recent years has had a very colorful career, coaching for UCLA for 12

VEGETARIAN RISSOLES

Filling and nourishing, Vegetarian Rissoles make an ideal vegetarian lunch or supper dish, and the children will love them. Preparation and cooking time: 1 1/4 hrs makes about 4 servings.

4 oz (1 1/2 cup) red lentils, soaked overnight, cooked and drained.
1 large onion, finely chopped
1 celery stalk, finely chopped
2 small carrots, grated
2 oz. green beans, cooked and finely chopped
2 oz. white bread crumbs.

3 eggs
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon dried mixed herbs
3 oz. dry white bread crumbs

Place the lentils, onion, celery, carrots, beans, fresh white bread crumbs, 2 of the eggs, the salt and the pepper and mixed herbs in a medium sized mixing bowl. Using a wooden spoon, mix well until the ingredients are thoroughly combined.

Using your hands, shape the mixture into 8 equal sized balls and flatten between the palms of your hands to make small cakes. Set aside.

Using a fork, beat the remaining egg in a shallow dish. Place the dry bread crumbs on a plate. Dip each rissole first in the egg and then into the bread crumbs, coating the rissoles thoroughly and shaking off any excess crumbs.

In a medium sized frying pan, heat the vegetable oil over moderate heat. When the oil is hot, add the rissoles and fry them for 10 minutes on each side or until they are golden brown.

Remove the pan from the heat. Using a fish slice, transfer the rissoles to kitchen paper towels and drain. Place the rissoles on a warmed serving dish and serve immediately.


